Councilwoman Montone stated the park has a name, the Freneau Woods Park. We are very excited, it is for passive recreation. The County is mapping out trails.

Councilman Cannon stated he is excited Aberdeen will be donating our property to the park. We started the process getting the Hauser Farm and 22 acres originally. On March 28, 2015 we attended the Grand Opening of Air Trampoline; it is a great place, a lot of fun.

Councilman Cannon thanked everyone for their hard work on this budget, especially Holly Reycraft and Angela Morin. We are proud to deliver a budget with an increase of 3.72% in really difficult times. Hurricane Sandy ended, but for the town it has been tough. Our Capital Budget is flooded with replacements, two pumping stations had to be replaced, two footbridges, a park and seawall at the waterfront. This has been a drain on our budgets. We have been able to keep the Road Program going with Rose Street, Lakeshore Drive, Warren Drive, Englewood and Avondale. We cut over \$200,000 in this budget.

Holly Reycraft stated Volunteer Recognition is Thursday at 7 p.m.; Aberdeen Day is scheduled for September 26, 2015.

Councilman Cannon stated we originally waived fees for residents with Hurricane Sandy damage. There are people on Beach Drive that need to raise their houses due to the Flood Certification. What are other towns doing?

Holly Reycraft stated she will look to see what other towns are doing.

There were no further reports.

WHEREAS, the State of New Jersey is committed to building a continuum of community-based child abuse prevention and intervention programs that are culturally competent, strength-based and family-centered and that achieve positive outcomes for parenting and family relationships, as well as empower domestic violence victims and their children; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Department of Children and Families embraces the Standards for Prevention Programs developed by the New Jersey Task Force on Child Abuse and Neglect; and

WHEREAS, all sectors of the community, including law enforcement, medical professionals, schools, courts and media outlets, as well as numerous public and private agencies, have joined forces to promote public awareness and community involvement in strengthening families during the month of April and continuing throughout the year.

NOW, THEREFORE, ON BEHALF OF THE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL, I, FRED TAGLIARINI, MAYOR OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ABERDEEN, do hereby proclaim April 2015 as *Child Abuse Prevention and Awareness Month* and urge our residents to become involved in efforts aimed at strengthening families and communities and preventing our children from being abused and neglected.

HEARING OF THE CITIZENS/CORRESPONDENCE AND PETITIONS

Mayor Tagliarini asked any member of the public wishing to be heard to come forward and to state their name and address.

Mrs. Schmidt stated she came to talk about the solicitor ordinance of 2013, Ordinance 11-2013. There has not been much publicity about it. There are 157 residents that applied for the no-knock registry. I think we are at the time of year where peddlers are coming out. We need to educate our residents. In Holmdel there was a situation, a resident called the police because she saw two men walking around and it turned out one person was wanted in Chicago for burglars and the other ISIS was looking for them. Can we do something to publicize this ordinance? The Independent newspaper does not go to Cliffwood and Cliffwood Beach.

Holly Reycraft stated we can get this out.

Councilwoman Montone stated she had a recent incident. Even if someone is wearing an

I.D., if you don't feel comfortable you do not have to open your door. If you don't see an I.D. don't open your door and call the police. I think our website is a real good place to start and to remind people through code red.

Mayor Tagliarini stated let's make the effort to get this out.

Karen Ventura, Township Clerk stated at this point, there are no solicitors/peddlers that have permits.

Mayor Tagliarini thanked Mrs. Schmidt for bringing this up.

Mrs. Tulle stated she lives on the curve on Deerfield Lane. Over the years the flooding has gotten progressively worse. It is bad. In the winter it is a sheet of ice. It is starting to cave in.

Councilman Cannon stated there is a book made by the Township Engineer where all the roads in town are rated. This was updated 4 years ago. The D section is coming close to top of the list. We do about 3 or 4 roads a year, approximately \$2.5 million each year. We will get the book and let you know where you are on the list.

Mrs. Tulle thanked Council.

Mrs. Osbourne stated for the last two years her children attended the Summer Adventures Program. She recently received an email stating the Program changed and will cost \$100 a week. I have three children and cannot pay \$300 a week. We paid \$530 plus activities now it will cost over \$1800.

Holly Reycraft stated the email was for the H.A.M. Program which is for special needs. I don't believe the price has changed for the Summer Adventures Program; we would have passed a resolution to increase the fees.

Mrs. Osbourne stated you needed to clarify this.

Holly Reycraft stated we will do another email blast.

Mrs. Osbourne stated regarding the speeding on County Road, she submitted pictures to the Council of a parked car that was hit by car with all children around. Traffic has been accumulating so much. In two weeks the traffic going back and forth was 15,000 cars in a residential area in the winter. What is going to be done? Sgt. Lloyd recommended signs, blinking flashing lights.

Mayor Tagliarini stated they will form a committee with three council members to meet

with Sgt. Lloyd and Holly Reycraft and come up with more concrete solutions.

Mrs. Gumbs stated she has organized “Concerned Citizens of Greater Aberdeen” and a couple things come out at the meeting. Midland Park is in bad shape, basketball court is cracked and faded, swings are old, needs to be revitalized. There will be a big event in the summer.

Councilman Cannon stated we have money for the basketball courts.

Holly Reycraft stated we are looking at all the playground equipment to see what needs to be replaced.

Mrs. Gumbs stated the drugs are back in the park by the wooden bridge.

Holly Reycraft stated Chief Powers spoke to her about it and they will put out extra patrols.

- _____ (7) Matters affecting pending or anticipated litigation to which the public body may be party; matters within the attorney-client privilege;
- _____ (8) Personnel matters concerning the employment, appointment evaluation, promotion or termination of a public officer or employee;
- _____ (9) Deliberations which may result in the imposition of civil penalty or the Suspension or loss of license or permit.
